## The Graduate School of International Studies (GSIS)



GSIS was established in 1991 in response to the growing forces of globalization and internationalization. By 1996 the Korean government was calling for experts in commercial policy, international relations, and area studies; and by March 1997, GSIS obliged with graduate programs in International Commerce, International Cooperation, and International Electronic Commerce. In late 1996, the Korean Ministry of Education designed GSIS as one of Korea's top five graduate schools of international studies qualified for a major five-year government grant.

The major goals of GSIS are to educate and train specialists in international relations, international commerce, and Korean studies, as well as to promote foreign language skills. It offers two master's degree programs under the departments of International Studies and Korean Studies. GSIS welcomes all nationalities. All courses are taught in English.

## I. Department of International Studies



The Department of International Studies strives to educate and train specialists in international commerce and cooperation. The current emphasis is on the following intellectual themes:

## International Finance

This course of study focuses on a number of topics in Open Macroeconomics understanding the open economy, efficiency of foreign exchange market, models of fiscal and monetary policy in an open economy, problems for macroeconomic policy management associated with international capital flows, and international policy coordination. The program is designed for students to develop working knowledge of various theoretical methods and practical issues in international macroeconomics by the end of the course. Critical and analytical thinking about these various topics and understanding of how they are related to the every day lives of the people in the world constitute the overall goal of the course.

## International Organization

In the era of globalization and interdependence, not only nation states but also international organizations, NGOs, social movements and other actors play an important role in shaping the nature of global politics. Without proper understanding of these non-state actors, one cannot be said to have mastered the real functions of international relations. This course is concerned with international organizations broadly defined. Students will explore wide aspects of the functions and exchanges among states, international organizations, and individuals. The specific themes covered in the course include: the role of international organizations in global politics, the process of regional integration, and the causes of cooperation and conflict at the multiple levels of international relations. The course should help students understand and explain the complex nature of political processes leading to the formation and practice of regional institutions. The International Organization studies at GSIS is designed for students who wish to undertake advanced work in preparation for careers in international organizations and non-governmental organizations (NGOs), or to promote their understanding of the subjects. By examining the goals, tasks, and activities of various international organizations and NGOs and by defining major issues facing these organizations, this course hopes to provide each student an opportunity to develop each student's own research agenda.

## International Security

## I-2 Academic Requirements

GSIS requires graduates a minimum of 52 credits, and a minimum 3.0(out of 4.5) grade point average. In addition to 22 credits from core courses, 15 from one's major, and 6 from area studies, GSIS students select 9 credits of elective work. These credits may be used to provide more depth in the major program, to build breadth in other programs, or to complete extramural programs.

## I-3 Student Support

### 1. Scholarship

GSIS students may pursue scholarships funds provided under the auspices of the central and local governments as well as the private sector. GSIS also extends partial financial support to students in selective instances to meet costs of extramural intensive academic training and internship program.

### 2. Research Assistantship

Selected students receive research assistantship that offers academic experience and financial remuneration.

### 3. Other Support

**Financial Support:** GSIS offers limited financial support to students who participate in international conferences and workshops abroad.

**Student Welfare:** GSIS runs the Computer-Aided Instruction (CAI) laboratory to facilitate students' computer works. Also, the Career Development Center aids students seeking internship and/ or post-graduate employment at

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international organizations, international NGOs, and public and private sector firms. For those who desire further study, GSIS provides specific information about Ph.D. programs worldwide.

## I-4 Application Procedures

### 1. Requirements

#### M.A.

An applicant must possess a bachelor's degree or equivalent, or be in their final undergraduate semester with an excellent academic record. He or she must also be qualified in at least one of the following categories.

- Demonstrated language proficiency through an English language test such as TOEFL, TOEIC or IELTS
- Minimum of four years of high school (or higher) education conducted in English or in relevant foreign language. Certified license in interpretation in the relevant language.
- Minimum of four years of work experience in a relevant country or region.
- Highest grade awarded in a language examination given by the government of a relevant country or region.
- Public or private sector work experience specialized in international or regional affairs with recommendation from a supervisor.
- Outstanding academic achievement within the top five percent of an undergraduate institution or university with a recommendation from its president or dean.

#### Ph.D.

Applicants must possess a master's degree and excellent academic records in addition to the above mentioned requirements.

*※ Graduates of a high school or university outside of Korea where instruction was not in English must submit an official English proficiency test score.*



## 2. Screening Procedure

- Applicants must submit their academic transcript, statement of purpose, curriculum vitae, and letters of recommendation.
- An interview conducted in English assesses applicants' knowledge and understanding of the selected field of studies.

※ *In case of applicants from overseas, phone interviews may be necessary.*

## II. Department of Korean Studies



The Department of Korean Studies at GSIS is designed for international and domestic students to enhance their understanding of Korea, particularly contemporary Korea. GSIS offers both a two-year master's degree and a one-year

certificate program.

Students affiliated with other educational institutions who wish to deepen their understanding of Korea may earn transfer credits for one semester or one year of research at GSIS.

All program courses are conducted in English. However, such courses as Korean Language or Readings in Korean avail students with intensive training in the Korean language. The program accepts new students for both spring and fall semesters each year.

## II-2. Academic Requirements

### Two-Year M.A. Program

#### Credits and GPA

The Korean Studies Department requires a minimum of 52 credits and a minimum of a 3.0 (out of 4.5) grade point average for a degree.

#### Required Courses

MA students are supposed to earn 31 required credits.

#### Elective Courses

The remaining 21 credits are elective: 12 credits should be obtained from the Korea Studies major courses; 9 credits from International Studies major courses.

Students are allowed to take a maximum of 9 credits from the GSIS of other universities or from the other departments of Korean University. Earned credits substitute elective course credits.

Two-Month Internship, upon university approval, is worth 3 credits and maximum 6 credits are allowed for Internship. Earned credits also substitute elective course credits.

#### Korean Language

Students are expected to be proficient in Korean language by taking language classes. All students must take a placement test-essay writing and personal interview-at the beginning of the first semester and the level (I,II,III, or Waive) is to be decided. Waived credits must be earned by taking additional elective courses beyond the assigned 21 credits. Levels are progressive: after passing one level, students proceed to the next. Each class comprises a maximum of 15 students.

### M.A. Thesis

All students pursuing a M.A. degree must submit a thesis. Students are advised to choose their own thesis topic as early as possible and consult its feasibility with a supervisor of their own choice. All (regular, adjunct, and visiting) professors affiliated with GSIS qualify as a thesis supervisor. A normal length of a M.A. thesis is around 100 pages (double-spaced). For a degree, a M.A. thesis must be submitted and approved within 4 years after students' entrance to the program.

### III. Wagner School-GSIS Dual Degree Program

The Robert F. Wagner Graduate School of Public Service at New York University and the Graduate School of International Studies at Korea University jointly offer a program for preparing professional careers in management of international public organizations.

The Wagner School-GSIS Dual Degree Program is an intensive two-year course for those who now work or have worked for multinational organizations and aspire to widen their management background to enter positions of greater leadership.

Students who complete this program acquire a master's degree from both GSIS and Wagner School.

#### III-1. Academic Requirements

Applicants must meet the respective requirements of both schools. Each must complete 26 credits at GSIS and eight courses at Wagner School for a total of 32 credits. Dual degree program students must submit a final thesis to GSIS in the last semester to receive a master's degree from both GSIS and Wagner School.

#### III-2. Application Procedures

Dual degree program candidates must satisfy application criteria of both schools. We welcome both Korean and foreign persons with working backgrounds in multinational organizations to apply.



## IV. Special Programs

### IV-2. Exchange Programs

GSIS collaborates closely with three universities worldwide: the Robert F. Wagner Graduate of Public Service, New York University; Graduate School of International Development, Nagoya University; School of International Service, American University. Students may apply after their first semester at GSIS for international study opportunities through these exchange programs. These exchange programs reinforce the international dimension of GSIS curriculum and research. Students should review course offerings to determine which credits can be transferred to GSIS. The exchange initiative accepts approximately two to three students each year per program.

### IV-2. Summer Programs

#### 1. The American and International Public Affairs Institute Program (AIPAI)

AIPAI is an intensive one-month program that introduces graduate students to American culture and institutions as well as globalization process prior to beginning formal graduate study. It comprises lectures and workshops with Wagner School professors and US public officials, institutional visits (in New York and Washington, D.C.), and cultural activities. #### 2. The Academy of International Trade Law

The Academy of International Trade Law is based in Macao and organized by the local European Studies Institutes-spans two weeks in July. Leading experts from around the world provide the highest standard of education and training on international trade law, the World Trade Organization, and selected issues of regional integration bodies such as the North Atlantic Free Trade Agreement, European Union, Mercosur, and ASEAN. ### 3. The Sciences-Po Asia-Europe Program

This six-week intensive graduate program offers a select group of advanced Asian students and young professionals insight into the main parameters of European integration. ### 4. Free University of Berlin International Summer Program

The International Summer Program at the Free University of Berlin offers 6-8 week intensive courses in German, French, Italian, as well as specialized curricula in economics, politics, trade and international security with emphasis on Euroatlantic and Eurasian affairs. ### 5. Afro-Asian Studies Institute, Peking University (Peking, China)

Contemporary studies of China in Peking University offer students a four week-long program to learn intensively about China's current issues, such as human right, Taiwan issue, political transition, environmental issue, diplomatic policy, and economic difficulties after open-door policy from China's perspective with experts from Peking University. As well as discussion based studies of contemporary China, this program provides a basic Chinese course.

## 6. Internship

GSIS encourages students to apply classroom-attained knowledge in an internship that provides fresh practical experience to refine upon return. Students put theory to the test in real-world situations and learn to adjust it. Both domestically and abroad, many have interned in various international institutions such as the U.N., the Asian Development Bank, international NGOs, government organizations, research centers, and private corporations. To earn credit, internships must be full-time for a minimum of two months.
