Sangjoon Lee is an Associate Professor of Cinema Studies at the City University of Hong Kong's School of Creative Media. He is the author of Cinema and the Cultural Cold War: US Diplomacy and the Origins of the Asian Cinema Network (2020; Korean edition 2023 and Chinese edition 2024) and the editor/co-editor of Hallyu 2.0: The Korean Wave in the Age of Social Media (2015), Rediscovering Korean Cinema (2019), The South Korean Film Industry (2024), Remapping the Cold War in Asian Cinemas (2024), and The Routledge Companion to Asian Cinemas (2024). Currently, he is editing two volumes, Netflix and South Korean Media in a Globalizing World and The Oxford Handbook of South Korean Cinema. Lee's works have been translated into Korean, Japanese, Chinese, and Italian.

Haerin Shin is an Associate Professor of Media & Communication Studies and the Director of the Intercultural AI Ethics Research Center at Korea University. Shin's research fields include Asian American literature & media, science fiction, and the ethics and aesthetics of artificial intelligence. She has written on cyberbullying, posthuman spirituality, techno-Orientalism, the ethics of artificial intelligence, and surveillance technologies, and she is now working on a book on the representation of artificial intelligence in science fiction.

teaching and researching on Australia and East Asia's creative industries and the digital and big data research methods to study them. He is an internationally regarded expert on cinema and new media, particularly the global spread of South Korea's webtoon transmedia entertainment industries and their influence across Greater China and North America. Through his successful competitive research grants from the Academy of Korean Studies, the Korea Foundation, the Asia Research Fund, and the Australian Research Council, among others, he has developed extensive links with cultural industry leaders, creative practitioners, and academics, including significant connections across Asia and Europe. The impact and influence of his work are illustrated by 4 books and nearly 100 high-impact academic publications, which are cited by scholars and policymakers around the world. His book South Korea's Webtooniverse (2021) is the first major study to offer deep insights on this globally facing platform environment, highlighting the transformation of East Asian media in a globalized society.


